Timeline

410 Roman rule in Britain ends

448-550 Jutes, Angles and Saxons invade and settle

793 Vikings raid Lindisfarne Monastery

794 Onwards Viking raids on the British Isles

865 Great Viking army from Denmark invades

866 Vikings capture York (Jorvik) and settle

876 Vikings settle permanently in England

886 King Alfred the Great defeats the Vikings but allows them to settle in the Kingdoms of York and East Anglia. Known as Danelaw ruled by King Guthrum

901-937 Danelaw conquered by the Saxons

954 Eric Bloodaxe, the last Viking King of Jorvik is thrown out

980 Viking raids on England


994 Vikings lead an unsuccessful siege of London and ransack South East of England

1014 King Canute of Denmark captures England

1042 Edward the Confessor (Saxon) becomes King

1066 Norman invasion. William the Conqueror becomes first Norman King

Jorvik – Viking name for York Danelaw – part of England ruled by Vikings

King – male ruler of a kingdom

Warrior – brave or experienced soldier

Freeman – person who is not a slave


Slave – person who is the property of another who is forced to obey them

Barbarian – person from a different land, culture or group believed to be inferior, uncivilized or violent; non-Christian

Heathen – person who does not belong to a common religious group

Thatched – cover of a building or roof of straw or reeds

Longboat – type of large rowing boat Longhouse – wooden one-room dwelling
